# Reading, Arithmetic, and Title I. By Noell Fritz

You may think because of the name, that Title I has something to do with the government and doesn't pertain to your child. It does, more than you think. Title I is reading and math support. Lonedell R-XIV is a fully funded Title I school. This allows Title I teachers to pull anyone who needs help. How might I know if my child needs help? Look at their grades or ask them if they need help and if you're not sure how to help, contact our Title I teachers, your child's teacher, or the

school office. Classroom teachers may request additional math or reading assessment. How can they do that? Well, there are specific tests they can do called the Slosson and DRA tests. Title I will push -in to their class where they receive one on one help in the area where they struggle. Title I also

# What is Title I about? By Kierstin Beavin

What Title I teachers do is go into the classroom and help any student with reading or math. Classroom teachers can send students to Title I and they will help them individually or in small groups, These students are mostly Kindergarten through Fourth grade. Title I also helps Fifth through Eighth grade students as well. Resources include games to help students interact with work. Mrs. Mathers and Mrs. Dierker will go to teacher meetings to tell about resources they have. A reading resource strategy is to ask the student what happened in the story and the sequence of events. Title I also has a Family Fun Night. This includes interactive math and reading games. These occur on concert nights and are free. It informs parents of ideas to

help their student. The Federal Government gives money to the state, then the state decides which school district gets the money to fund Title I. What also helps with Title I is the salaries the Federal Government gives.

Submit the \$13.25 Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services registration fee (first time only). 4. View the film "Smarter Adults, Safer Children" Training Video

Parent Responsibilities: We, as parents, will support our children's learning in the following ways: Making sure my child receives the proper amount of sleep, a good meal, has proper school supplies, and attends school every day. Making sure that my child spends the proper amount of time in home study and preparation for his/her class. Volunteering in my child's classroom and taking interest in school activities and organizations. Participating, as appropriate, in decisions relating to my children's education. Promoting positive use of my child's extracurricular time. Staying informed about my child's education and communicating with the school by promptly reading all notices from the school or the school district either received by my child or by mail and responding, as appropriate. 53 Meeting with my child's teacher (s) and inquire about his/her progress in school work; contacting the teacher/principal with any concerns about problems that may have an adverse effect upon my child.

# Parents Right To Know

Our district is required to inform you of certain information that you, according to The No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107-110), have the right to know.

Upon your request, our district is required to provide to you in a timely manner, the following information:

- Whether the teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria have been waived.
- Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications.
- What baccalaureate degree major the teacher has and any other graduate certification or degree held by the teacher, and the field of discipline of the certification.

In addition to the information that parents may request, districts must provide to each individual parent –

- Information on the achievement level of the parent's child in each of the state academic assessments as required under this part; and
- Timely notice that the parent's child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks by, a teacher who is not highly qualified.
